


In the West Partnership: Family Learning and Parental Engagement

Through discussions with keyworkers and two staff members who had attended an intergenerational learning network meeting, it was demonstrated that it can be beneficial for children and adults to engage in intergenerational learning. Grandparents bring their wealth of knowledge on Scottish culture and have skills which can be shared with children such as knitting, story telling, or gardening, and children bring their enthusiasm and energy for learning. It was decided as a centre we would take forward intergenerational learning for children. There are quite a few grandparents who already have daily contact with the centre bringing their grandchild to nursery and collecting them so we decided that our next stay and play session, we would invite grandparents to attend. The project is also looking at developing links with an elderly care home within the local area.

The aim of the project is to develop effective intergenerational learning working with grandparents and with elderly residents within care homes in the local community.

Method



Staff were in the process of organising a Health and Wellbeing stay and play session. It was decided that we would invite grandparents to come along and take part in the activities. Children in the 3-5 playroom were going to focus on healthy

eating. It was suggested they could make soup and take part in some traditional playground games. Grandparents could share the games they played when they were younger and the type of soup they enjoy. Children in the under three's were making healthy sandwiches for a tea party after the story 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea', finishing off the session with some traditional Scottish songs and rhymes. Babies were fruit tasting with their grandparents, finishing off with a book bug session.

Process Change

Grandparents felt that there were no areas to improve on.


Achievements

What next for your project?

- Apply for funding from Get Togethers: Bringing people together through food.
- Invite grandparents to join in with our celebration for Rabbie Burns day sharing traditional songs and rhymes.
- Invite grandparents to share any skills they have with the grandchildren, for
 - example gardening, knitting, playing an instrument, sharing traditional stories etc.
- Develop links within the community with a local care home.
- Liaise with activity coordinators within the care home to organise

regular visits with residents to take part in craft, and singing activities
